## **1** ARGUMENT SUMMARIES

In laying out the arguments below, make use of the readings, the slides and your class notes. You should demonstrate a full mastery of the arguments we discussed in class, and if you wish to do so, you may also strengthen them as you see fit.

- (a) Write the strongest possible argument for the claim that determinism is true.
- (b) Write the strongest possible argument for the claim that if determinism is true, then we do not have free will.
- (c) Write the strongest possible argument for the claim that if non-determinism is true, then we do not have free will.
- (d) Write the strongest possible argument for the claim that if determinism is true, then we still have free will.

## **2 DEFINITIONS**

State the definitions of "free will", "determinism" and "non-determinism" that you have used in the four arguments above. Have your definitions changed across the different arguments? Explain. If the definitions have changed, please identify the differences.

## **3** WEIGHING REASONS

- i. The arguments in (b) and (d) cannot be both correct. How so? Explain.
- ii. Once you have identified the source of the tension between (b) and (d), which of the two do you find to be the strongest argument? Explain your reasons carefully.
