Overview*

This course explores a representative sample of philosophical questions. In *part 1*, we will scrutinize arguments that philosophers have formulated to demonstrate the existence of God. In *part 2*, we will ask whether human freedom and moral responsibility still have a role to play in a world governed by the laws of modern physics. In *part 3*, we will explore what constitutes our identity as persons and the relationship between mind, consciousness and matter. In *part 4*, we will investigate the nature of time and change, in particular, whether time and change are mere constructions of our minds.


Materials
