Course topics¹

part 1 - law and interpretation - What makes a written text a piece of law? What principles inform the writing of laws? Are laws mere human conventions? How should judges decide difficult cases?

part 2 - law and morality - Are laws grounded on moral and ethical principles? Should we obey immoral laws? Why should we obey the law in the first place?

part 3 - algorithms and the justice system - How are algorithms used in the justice system today? Do they pose a threat? Can they improve the justice system?
